

How are we doing? "Musical Chairs"

- 2019→2022: Overall homelessness up 6%; unsheltered up 4%
- Deeply low-income households "competing" for fewer affordable housing options
- Prevention effort limits (+1,100 helped, +\$13.6M)

Emergency Housing Vouchers (EHVs)

Partnership with Housing Authority


- Highest voucher utilization in California and 13th highest in United States (110%)
- 188 property owners/managers and 57 new to such programs
- 295 households and over 425 individuals from homelessness to permanent housing



Next Six Months

- New coordinated entry and HMIS policies and procedures implementation
- Permanent supportive housing building fundraising and support (Homekey + more)
- Working toward stabilizing, expanding, and improving temporary housing capacity
- Securing funding to sustain and build upon Rehousing Wave infrastructure
- CalAIM health, human, housing services integration provider capacity building and infrastructure; data sharing for caring
- Improving the funding landscape through education, advocacy, and securing stable dollars for key infrastructure needs
